Special Session (Aug. 9 – Aug. 11, 2022)



- \$ 1,630,000,000 SURPLUS
 - Education
 - Tax Cuts
- \$1.378 b allotment reserve fund
- \$250 m other
- \$150 m restricted reserve
 - \$50 m law enforcement officers' stipend grant fund
 - \$50 m state highway and transportation fund (federal match)

Income Tax (HB 1002 and SB 1)

Income Tax

- These provisions will accelerate the implementation of <u>cutting</u> the State's top individual income tax rate from 5.5% to 4.9%, retroactive to Jan. 1, 2022.
 - The State's top individual income tax rate is scheduled to be cut to 5.3% on Jan. 1, 2023, to 5.1% on Jan. 1
 2024, and to 4.9% on Jan. 1, 2025, under current state law (from the Second Extraordinary Session).
- Another measure will <u>accelerate the reduction in the state's top corporate income tax rate to 5.3% on</u>
 Jan. 1, 2023.
 - Arkansas' top corporate income tax rate of 62% dropped to 59% on Jan. 1, 2022. The rate is scheduled to drop to 57% on Jan. 1, 2023, to 55% on Jan. 1, 2024, and to 53% on Jan. 1, 2025, under current state law.
- Finally, there will be a temporary nonrefunctable income tax credit of \$130 for individual topopyers with net income up to \$87000 — with a phase out of the credit for first having net income of up to \$10000 for tax year 2022 — and of \$300 for marined topopyers filing joinly with net income up to \$174,000 — with a phase out of the credit for files having net income up to \$202,000 for tax year 2022. These toxpayers will be required to be full-time residents of Aktorisas to receive the tax credit.

Section 179 Depreciation

- This law will adopt the 2022 federal Section 179 depreciation schedule as it existed Jan. 1, 2022, which provides an income tax reduction for the expensing of certain property.
- The federal Section 179 depreciation schedule allows businesses to deduct the entire purchase price of new or used equipment up to \$10.8 million in 2022, rather than capitating and depreciating the asset over the designated useful file of the asset. The \$1.08 million deduction is reduced dolar-for-dollar is asset purchase succeed \$2.7 million for 2022.



School Safety Grants
